#### SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME – FEBRUARY 20, 2022

This weekend (Feb. 19<sup>th</sup>/20<sup>th</sup>), the Church celebrates the **Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time**. As we continue to draw nearer and nearer to **Ash Wednesday** and the beginning of the **Lenten season**, our weekend's readings continue to prepare us for this coming penitential season. As we hear in our Gospel, the life of a Christian must be distinct from the lives of others. Though we are **in** the world, we do not live **for** it; We live for something greater.

The Christian-life requires going beyond worldly expectations. As Pope Benedict XVI famously said: "The world offers you comfort. But you were not made for comfort. You were made for greatness." The love God calls each of us to a love that exceeds all worldly expectations. For, it is in this love that we experience God, who Himself is love (1 John 4:8). Our earthly journey here and now is meant to prepare us for the heavenly kingdom.

The Church throughout the ages has called us to this Christian life that is aimed toward heaven. Though we are called and exhorted as such, though, we may often fall short of this life. Instead of aiming for the heavens, we turn inward. We place at the center of our hearts earthly things that will fade, pass away, and never satisfy. This is one of the reasons for the upcoming **season of Lent**, which calls us to a repentance that is earnest and lasting; To turn from our inwardness and closed-off selfishness and to instead open our hearts to the Lord, who alone is capable of satisfying the desire of our hearts.

We strive to provide a variety of opportunities with the hopes that they can, in some way, assist you in these coming forty days. I also encourage you to make use of our parish subscription to **Formed.org**, which offers a wide-variety of resources and programs for **Lent** (and every liturgical season).

#### **DID YOU KNOW?** THE CHURCH AND PURGATORY

Included in this bulletin is an insert from the June 26, 1921, edition of our diocesan printing of *Our Sunday Visitor*, known as *The Harmonizer* at that time in our diocese. This publication, begun by then-Fr. John F. Noll (*who would become the fifth bishop of our diocese*) in nearby Huntington, sought to provide information about the Catholic Faith on a national-level. This was done in response to various anti-Catholic publications of his day that were providing and promoting great mis-information about the Church.

The desire to proclaim the Gospel and provide greater knowledge about the Faith is not new. Whether it be our own local *Did You Know?* campaign or the past work of Fr. Noll with *Our Sunday Visitor*, the Church has, throughout the centuries, sought to explain Her teachings and proclaim the fullness of truth as guided by the Holy Spirit (Catechism of the Catholic Church, Para. 2625). We see this even in the beginnings of the Church, from the preaching of the Apostles (Acts 3:11-26) to St. Justin Martyr writing the Emperor Antonius Pius in AD 155 about the Faith so as "to afford to all an opportunity of inspecting our life and teachings."

As Fr. Noll indicates in the insert, there has been, over the past few centuries, much confusion regarding the Church's teaching on Purgatory. This truth of the Faith acknowledges a basic human reality: That we sin and fall short of God's glory (Rom. 3:23). The Catechism describes purgatory in this way: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven" (CCC 1030). The Church believes that purgatory is not eternal, but rather is a state of purification one experiences if needed before entering eternal life with God in heaven.

As the Scripture teaches us, nothing unclean can enter heaven (Rev. 21:27). Scripture also describes a place where a man goes and suffers loss, yet is still saved, but only through fire (1 Cor. 3:13-15). Purgatory is this place outside of time that cleanses us of whatever impurity that we may remain with us when we die, allowing us to enter into Heaven and be with God without the stain of sin.

# Why Do Catholics Believe In Purgatory?



GAIN the question should be reversed, and Protestants asked why they do NOT believe in Purgatory, since the Jews before Christ and since have believed in Purgatory, and the whole Christian world so believed until four hundred years ago. In fact, three-fourths of all Christians to today believe in a middle state in the other world to which Catholics give the name "Purgatory."

Impressions the most erroneous have given rise to prejudice he most deep-seated against this tenet of Catholic faith. Brush these impressions aside and Protestants will find themselves believing in Purgatory, because no point of Christian faith is more reasonable nor more scriptural.

Here the reader will probably object that the Bible does not even mention the word Purgatory. We grant this; but the doctrine has not to do with the word, but with the place which we call by that word. Neither does the Bible mention the word "Trinity," "Incarnation," "Sunday," "Bible," etc. Places and things exist first, and a name expressive of their significance is given to them. The Bible speaks of a place in the other world where the "last farthing" must be paid (Matt. V, 26); it speaks of people who "shall be saved, yet so as by fire" (I Cor. 14, 15); it speaks of a sin which shall not be forgiven "in the world to come" (Matt. XII, 32).

Now, the place referred to by these texts cannot be Heaven nor can it be Hell. Into Heaven nothing defiled can enter (Revel. XXI, 27); and no sin can be forgiven in Hell; the last farthing must be paid in another place before the soul may enter into heaven. The middle state of purgation is implied by every one of the one hundred passages of scripture which say, in substance, that a man will be rewarded or punished "according to his works." In this world people cannot be divided into two groups; there must be three, comprising respectively (1) the very good; (2) the very bad; (3) those who belong to neither of the other two extremes. If the very good deserve Heaven immediately, and the very bad, Hell, what about that large group of people who are not good enough for immediate Heaven, yet too good for eternal Hell?

If the Protestant answer that faith and trust in Christ will remove all sin from the soul of the dying Christian, we rejoin by asking how about the many who die suddenly, or who, after committing small sins, fail to turn their thoughts to Christ?

Human justice is a reflection of divine justice, but human justice demands that small offenses be punished by a light punishment, and serious crimes by a most severe punishment. Hence we have not only a penitentiary, where the criminal is punished for many years and even for life, but a jail, where the less serious law-breaker is punished for ten, thirty or sixty days. Purgatory in the other world takes the place of our jail here below.

Catholics do not hold that every one goes to Purgatory or even that the souls of all Catholics go thither; they do not hold that the priest, or even the Church, knows which particular souls are consigned to Purgatory, nor for how long a time; therefore they cannot bargain with the priest, as their enemies content, for the release of a soul by the payment of money for prayers or Masses. Catholics do hold that prayers, good works, and the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass may be offered by way of suffrage towards the payment of a "last farthing" of a departed soul. Prayer for the dead is as old as the human race, and is the most natural thing in the world; this is why it comes spontaneously even from the hearts of those, who profess not to believe in Purgatory. Whenever you whisper a prayer for a loved departed one, your action belies your profession, and your heart recognizes the existence of Purgatory.
