Dressing the Chalice

"Can you drink the chalice that I am going to drink?" Matthew 20:22

The **chalice** (from the Latin *calyx*) is the cup in which wine and water are mixed prior to the Consecration. Over the chalice is laid the purificator, a fine white linen cloth that is used to wipe the lip of the chalice and the priest after receiving the Precious Blood. It is also used to purify the chalice after Communion. The paten (from the Latin patena) is a circular dish made of precious metal on which is placed the priest's host.




Chalice, Purificator Paten with Host



The chalice is covered with a square of linen stiffened with cardboard. This covering, called the pall (from the Latin word for "cover") keeps foreign objects, including dust or insects, from falling into the chalice or onto the paten. Throughout the centuries, the pall has come to spiritually symbolize the stone which was Chalice, Purificator, placed over Christ's tomb.

The prepared chalice, purificator, paten, and pall are then covered completely by a veil, which is a piece of fabric that reflects the liturgical color of the season. The veil hides the chalice from view, which reminds us of the curtain in the Holy of Holies. The removal of the veil signifies the mysteries being opened to us.



note the different parts under the Veil On top of the veiled vessels is placed the burse, a square sack also made in the liturgical color of the season. The burse is a container for the **corporal**, a square piece of fine white linen that will be placed on the altar underneath the chalice and paten.

TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - OCTOBER 2, 2022

This weekend (October $1^{st}/2^{nd}$), the Church celebrates the **Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time**. Our readings take up the theme of faith, both of Israel's faith under the Old Covenant and the faith to which we are called in the New Covenant. Jesus urges us not to despair even if we feel that our faith is insufficient. As seen in the *Parable of the Mustard Seed*, God can work wonders using even the smallest of things.

Next weekend, we will "kick-off" the **36th Annual Bishop's Appeal (ABA)** at all Masses. In previous years, this included a showing of the **ABA** video. This year, the video is available online and can be viewed through our parish website. Pledge cards have already been sent to all registered households; Extra pledge cards available in the narthex. Thank you for returning your pledge card (*either by mail or in the collection basket*) and helping our parish reach **100%** participation.

This year's **ABA** theme is "*The Eucharist: Sacrament of Charity.*" As we enter into these three years of Eucharistic Revival, this theme reminds us of how, in the words of the Second Vatican Council, the Eucharistic sacrifice is the summit toward which all the activity of the church is directed. With this understanding, any funds that exceed our parish goal and returns to our parish will go towards **the building of an altar at St. Joseph Catholic Cemetery**.

The Eucharistic sacrifice, offered upon this altar, will serve as a powerful witness of both our hope of the resurrection and the union of the Church. In the Eucharist, we are united together as the Church on earth, in purgation, and in heaven as we worship before the throne of God. With the placement of an altar at the cemetery, we are given a visible reminder of how we remain united with our dearly departed loved ones through prayer.

BIBLE STUDY—A STUDY IN TYPOLOGY

Our most "signed-up" for group throughout our Registration & Ministry Weekend was for those interested in joining a Bible study. After much prayer over what book of the Bible to study, I felt it would be best to look at all of them! Instead of walking through a singular book, as we have done in the past, our Bible study this year will focus on the topic of typology.

Typology is our way of looking at the Old Testament through the lens of the New and understanding the New in the fulfillment of the Old. For example, we see a "*type*" of Jesus in Adam. St. Paul identifies this in 1 Corinthians 15:22, stating that "*just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life.*" Through Adam, the first man, death enters the world; Through Jesus, the new man, death is defeated. This is just one of many "types" we will see.

Our first meeting for "*A Study in Typology*" will be offered on Thursday, October 27th, at 7:30 PM in the Parish Social Hall. Each meeting will plan to run for one hour. Starting in November, we will plan to meet twice a month.

DID YOU KNOW? DRESSING THE CHALICE

Our bulletin cover this weekend describes the different items that can be used to "dress" or prepare the chalice for Mass. Each item often has both a practical and spiritual purpose. Even the material itself used for these items have meaning. Anything that holds the Body or Blood of our Lord (the Chalice and Paten) are made of precious materials as the Eucharist is the most precious thing on earth. The use of fine linen in both the purificator and the corporal should be reminiscent of the fine linen cloths used to wrap the body of our Lord for burial (cf. Matthew 27:59). The Chalice Veil and Burse are to match the priest's vestments, showing the connection between the priest, who offers sacrifice, and the instruments that are to be used in that same sacrifice.

These items, though often left unexplained, stand as silent witnesses to our Faith. Everything in the liturgy has a purpose and that purpose is to proclaim the Good News: *Jesus Christ is risen from the dead!* As in liturgy, so in life: *Everything we do and everything about us is to proclaim Jesus!* Faithfully in Christ, Fr. 
