What is Hallow's Eve is where the name of Halloween comes from. A hallowed person is another name for a saint. We call October 31st All Hallow's Eve because it is the eve of All Saints Day on November 1st.
The Mass that the Catholic Church celebrated on November 1st was called Allhallomas. This meant Mass of All the Hallowed or Mass of All Saints. This day was commonly called All Hallows' Day.
The night before November 1st became known as Allhallowe'en, short for the evening before All Hallows' Day. Eventually, it was shortened to Halloween.
Why do we celebrate All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day?  November 1st is called the Solemnity of All Saints. On this day, the Church celebrates with all those who have died and are now in heaven with God.
Everyone who has lived and died in Jesus' love is a <b>Saint</b> . We do not know the names of all of the Saints. Some of these people were so much like Jesus that, after they died, the Church definitively proclaimed them to be in heaven.
November 2 <sup>nd</sup> is called the <b>Commemoration of All Souls</b> .  On this day, we remember our departed loved ones and pray for all those who have died and are in need of our prayers.

As a reminder, Daylight Savings Time **ends** next Sunday, November 6<sup>th</sup>. Don't forget to turn your clocks **back** one hour next Sunday.

This weekend (October 29<sup>th</sup>/30<sup>th</sup>), the Church celebrates the **Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time**. We are, once again, entering into the last month of the liturgical year. In four weeks, we will celebrate the end of the year with the **Solemnity of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe**. The new liturgical year will begin the following week (Nov. 26<sup>th</sup>/27<sup>th</sup>) as we enter into **Advent**.

Our readings throughout these remaining weekends begin to focus on the themes of repentance, reparation, and the final judgment. We are urged not only to repent while we still have time to do so, but also to right the wrongs we have done to others, that is, to make reparation for our actions. These themes will continue for the remainder of the liturgical year, using its coming end to remind us of our own mortality.

Though these themes may seem overwhelming, they are not meant to be so. Instead, they are meant to remind us of a simple truth: If we walk with Christ, He will lead us safely to the end of our earthly pilgrimage and guide us to the heavenly kingdom. Just as the year begins and ends with Christ, so too must our lives. Only in this do we realize that it is not for this world that we live; Instead, our hearts long for where our true treasure is. Or, in the words of St. Augustine of Hippo: "You have made us for yourself O Lord and our heart is restless until it rests in you."

#### HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION: SOLEMNITY OF ALL SAINTS

As a reminder, this Tuesday, November 1<sup>st</sup>, is a **Holy Day of Obligation** as we celebrate the **Solemnity of All Saints**. Masses for the Holy Day will be offered on: **Monay, Oct. 31<sup>st</sup>, at 7:00 PM and Tuesday, Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> at 7:00 AM, Noon, and 6:00 PM.** Following the 6:00 PM Mass on Tuesday, Nov. 1<sup>st</sup>, join us for our annual **All Saints' Day Potluck and Party** in the **Parish Social Hall and Gym**. (*Reminder: You are invited to dress up as your favorite Saint and join in the procession at the beginning of the 6:00 PM Mass. Please arrive by 5:50 PM to join the procession as 'the Saints go marching in.')* 

The following day, Wednesday, November 2<sup>nd</sup>, marks the **Commemoration** of All Souls, or All Souls' Day. Though this day is not a holy day, it is an important day nonetheless as we remember and pray for all those who have died. To emphasize the importance of this day, the Church encourages priests to offer three Masses on this day. With this allowance, we will offer Masses for All Souls' Day on Wed., Nov. 2<sup>nd</sup>, at 8:00 AM, Noon, and 6:00 PM. (Note: The 6:00 PM All Souls' Day Mass will be offered at St. Joseph Catholic Cemetery on IN-124. Please bring your own chair.)

Throughout the month of November, you will also notice votive candles surrounding the statues of the Blessed Mother and St. Joseph. Each votive candle has listed, serving as a reminder of our dearly departed loved ones. May they serve as a constant reminder to lift all those who have died to the Lord in and through our prayers, that they might enter into the glory of the Kingdom.



# DID YOU?

#### WE HAVE FRIENDS IN HEAVEN

Looking at the lives of those who have faithfully followed Jesus Christ, we see a great cloud of witnesses (Heb. 12:1). These men and women, known as Saints, are our brothers and sisters in Christ who, having gone before us, are before God's throne in Heaven (Rev. 5:8). They support us with their prayers and friendship so that we too might one day join in the same heavenly chorus, praising God together for all eternity.

Our relationship with the Saints requires a true understanding of the difference between worship and prayer. Worship is adoration and is given to God alone. Prayer is a form of conversation in which we speak to God and to all those in union with

Him. We adore God alone. We have a devotion towards and pray to God's Saints who are now united with Him in Heaven.

Though the Saints have passed into eternity, they are not dead. As our Lord Himself reminds us, our God "is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to Him all are alive" (Luke 20:38). As members of the one Body of Christ (1 Cor. 12:27), we remain, even now, united to those who have gone before us. As St. Paul reminds us, nothing, not even death itself, can separate us in Christ (Rom. 8:38-39).

We can turn to Jesus through the Saints. Just as we ask our loved ones on earth to pray for us (cf. 2 Thes. 3:1; Rom. 15:30), so we also ask our heavenly brothers and sisters to pray for us as well. As St. James reminds us: "The fervent prayer of a righteous person is very powerful" (James 5:16).

# DID YOU?

PURGATORY AND PRAYING FOR THE DEAD

Purgatory is that name which the Catholic Church gives to our final purification, which occurs at the end of our life. Because we still sin in this life, but we will not sin when we are in glory, there is a final period of purification between our death and glorification in Jesus. Purgatory is this final act of sanctification, earned for us through Jesus Christ's sacrifice upon the Cross, and serves as our transition into glory.

If we die in the love of God but possess any "stains of sin," such stains are cleansed away in this final purifying process. Purgatory itself is not a place but a stage or process in the afterlife. In this stage, the dead are aided by the prayers of the living. This is exemplified in the Scriptural account of Judas Maccabeus, who had sacrifices offered in Jerusalem to make "atonement for the dead that they might be absolved from their sins" (2 Maccabees 12:39-45). This same practice of prayer has also been attested to throughout history. St. Augustine of Hippo states that "the whole Church observes this practice, which was handed down by tthe Fathers" (Sermons 172.2, 411 AD).

Having passed through purgatory, we will be utterly unselfish and fully capable of perfect love. Our selfish ego, which restlessly sought our own self-satisfaction, will finally have died forever. Our "new self" will be our same inner self, but will be purified and transformed by the intensity of God's love. In this way, we obtain "that holiness without which no one will see the Lord" (Hebrews 12:14).
